

Dr. Adu MA, MD, FRCP. He qualified from Oxbridge and trained in Guys Hospital London, moving to Birmingham in the early eighties.

He is highly respected as an expert clinician and Nephrologist at the Q.E and nationally and internationally as a member of the kidney community. His research has been published in the most prestigious of medical journals and he is recognised as an international expert in the field of kidney disease due to S.L.E.(Systemic lupus erythematosus)

He is also recognised for his tireless research in the field of kidney disease in the ethnic minority groups which is particularly important within the population of the West Midlands.

Dr. Adu has held executive positions in the Royal College of Physicians and influential health organisations, The Kings Fund and the British Renal Association.

Dr. Adu's time at the QE will be most remembered for his absolute dedication to providing expert patient care and his human touch.

As a mark of his tireless service to patients with kidney disease for more than 25 years, the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Kidney Patients' Association has presented Jo with a gift on behalf of all the renal patients and we hope he will enjoy using it.

## The First type of "filter" used to dialyse patients



Do any of our readers remember dialysing using one of these?

Kiil board dialysers are in layers like sandwiches, a layer of plastic, 2 layers of cellophane (the dialysis membrane), another layer of plastic, another 2 layers of cellophane and a further layer of plastic. They were clamped together tightly. It was often called the "kiil sandwich" and it required a fair amount of skill and experience to make. These dialysers were cleaned and lined by technicians, who were exposed to the risk of infection.

## SUMMER TREATS

We are all looking forward to warmer weather, fresh foods and a chance to eat 'al fresco'. Barbeques are a great way to cook your food with the minimum fat but the maximum taste. Here are some ideas of summertime foods you can enjoy without upsetting your diet

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Barbequed:	Chicken portions
	Steak
	Fish
	Lamb/pork chops or kebabs
	Beef burgers
Served with:	Garlic bread or crusty rolls
	Pasta or rice salads
	Mixed green salads – e.g. Apple & celery or a little lettuce, cucumber and green
	peppers

You can use a little French dressing or salad cream or mayonnaise.

For dessert:	Pavlova
	Lemon cheesecake
	Ice cream

N.B. 5 cherries or 10 strawberries or 1 small peach/nectarine or 20 raspberries count as 1 potassium portion.

Of course hot weather makes you thirsty so be careful if your drinks are limited. It's very easy to drink too much just because you think you're 'sweating it off'.

Check with your dietitian or nurse before you increase your fluid intake.


These tips may help:-Try sucking cold fresh lemon slices – they help stimulate saliva.

Use a few canned pineapple chunks

Flavour Ice cubes with a little lemon juice or orange squash.

Do make sure you spread your allowances through the day and save some for night-time. When the nights are very humid you will find it difficult to survive without at least 1 glass of water to sip.

## **DUDLEY KIDNEY PATIENTS ASSOCIATION HOLIDAY HOMES**

Dudley Kidney Patients Association is the proud owner of three six berth holiday caravans which we let, throughout the summer season, to kidney patients and their families at a very reasonable rent. Initially they were bought for our own patients' use but we now also let them to patients from other areas. This includes haemodialysis, CAPD, APD and transplant patients.

The caravans are situated at Goodrington in Devon, Burnham-on-Sea in Somerset and Cirencester in the Cotswolds. All are on lovely sites with lots of facilities eg: indoor and outdoor swimming pools, shops, restaurants, bars, play and sports areas and within easy reach of many interesting places to visit.

Each caravan is well equipped with household items and each has a ramp and sun deck. Unfortunately we cannot provide haemodialysis facilities and these often prove difficult to obtain from local units as they are usually full with their own patients.

However, if local dialysis cannot be arranged, it is not too far to travel back from Cirencester or Burnham to your own unit and then return to your holiday afterwards. Part weeks can be booked, except in July and August.

Prices for the 2009 season range from £100 to £235 depending on when you go. This price is up to six people to stay for one week.
