The Q.E.H.K.P.A. congratulates and thanks all the team of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Renal Unit for this outstanding achievement.

Over the 50 years so many lives have been changed. The "Gift of Life" to so many is due to the dedication and care from all the staff involved. Not only has it changed the lives of those who have been fortunate to have had a kidney transplant but it gives hope to those who are waiting for one. Currently there are about 850 patients at the Q.E. who have had a kidney transplant. There are many more who had a transplant at the Q.E but are now living and being treated in other parts of the country. The Q.E. has carried out 4156 kidney transplants plus 994 living donor transplants in 50 years, so this year will also see the 5000th transplant and the 1000th living donor transplant. *What an achievement*.

At this time of celebration, one must never forget the generosity of all those who were the donors and their families who at a very sad and distressing time agreed to allow their organs to be used to help others.

Andrew Ready: How it all started at the Q.E.

The first transplant took place in May 1968. This was followed by further cases during that year. My predecessor, Tony Barnes, was the lead surgeon in this programme, but he was supported by his seniors at that time. These included Professor Frank Ashton, Professor Geoffrey Slaney (who was to become the President of the Royal College of Surgeons and was subsequently Knighted), and Mr. Paul Dawson-Edwards, who had been a Research Fellow at the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston U.S. of A. where the very first transplants had been performed. It is my understanding that Paul Dawson-Edwards continued to have friendship with the Nobel Laureates at Boston, but did not continue in the transplant programme at Birmingham, preferring to develop a career in urology.

Sadly, all these people are now deceased including Tony Barnes, who died in 2016. I had the privilege of being House Officer and Registrar to Frank Ashton and Geoff Slaney, knew Paul Dawson-Edwards slightly and was Registrar, Senior Registrar, and a Consultant colleague to Tony Barnes. I think it would be accurate to say that they were all exceptional individuals.

Andrew Ready receives an MBE



A very well-known name to many of us, Mr Andrew Ready, Consultant Transplant Surgeon, at the Q.E. was recognised for his outstanding work in transplantation with an MBE in the New Year's Honours list.

Mr Ready joined the Q.E. in 1995 as a Renal Transplant Surgeon. Not only has he done outstanding work at the Q.E., he has played a major role in developing renal transplantation in the developing world. He is also Medical Director of a charity that is dedicated to support renal transplantation in the developing world and has taken voluntary teams to Ghana, Nigeria, Trinidad, Jamaica, Barbados and Nepal to undertake kidney transplants and to pass on his knowledge to Doctors and Surgeons in those countries.

The claim forms are available at your dialysis unit or the Cashier's Office at the Q.E. on the ground floor, near Renal Outpatients.

The travel costs cover, bus, train and parking and also taxi if your clinician considers it's necessary due to your medical condition.

These are the benefits you need to be receiving to be eligible: -

Income Support, Income Bases, Employment Support Allowance, Income Based Job Seekers Allowance, Low income, HC2 or HC3 Certificate, Tax Credits with exemption cert, Pension Credit Guarantee Credit, Universal Credit. At Christmas, the K.P.A. was able to fund festive activities at many of the dialysis units where staff or patients were

able to organise them. This is something we would like all the units to take part in, if not at Christmas time at some of the many other festive events throughout the year to suit the patients. This is made possible by the very many donations we receive throughout the year.

Research Project

The K.P.A. has agreed to support a research project which will be looking at methods to increase the time that a donor kidney can be kept before it is transplanted. Currently this is between 6 and 24 hours. If this time could be increased to a few days the benefits would be significant. There would be more time for detailed tests to check that the kidney is a match, planned surgery and hopefully more kidneys could be used. It could lead to less rejection in the short term and also reduce the amount of drugs a patient would need to take. These are a few of the benefits, The K.P.A. is supporting the funding of

this research over 5 years at a cost for £20,000 per year. Again, this has been made possible by the very generous support we have had from the renal community.

Supporting Healthy eating

Andy Allsopp & Rob Kelly are new Managers for Non-Emergency Patient Transport within Birmingham. Both Managers have a wealth of experience within the Emergency Ambulance Service and hope their knowledge will be able to benefit the NEPT Service in Birmingham.

Andy has been in the Ambulance Service for 11 years and is a practicing Paramedic. Rob has worked in the NHS for 18 years. 16 years have been with West Midlands Ambulance Service in Emergency Operations as Controller and Control Manager.

As a Trust, they take the responsibility for transporting patients to their appointments and Dialysis seriously. "As a Trust we understand this is a demanding time for patients and the regular journeys they take for these appointments can have a massive impact on their health."

Rob has seen close friends go through this experience and understands at a personal level how this can affect an individual's life.

Because of this, they want to ensure that patients have as safe and comfortable a journey as possible. Throughout Birmingham, Renal Coordinators have been introduced to cover the units and are able to listen to patients' experiences whilst acting on queries and concerns.

Andy and Rob participate in meetings with patient representatives and operational meetings with the local Trusts to maintain an understanding of any issues arising.

Patients have access to West Midlands Ambulance Service Patient Advice & Liaison Service to raise concerns or give compliments. From this, the Trust is able to act in making changes to help patients.

With the inception of the new Pan-Birmingham contract in May 2017, some challenges have been experienced within the transition from the old to the new contract.

We have seen great improvements and acted upon listening to our patients. We have shown examples where we have taken this information, made adjustments and have received positive feedback. Whilst we know there are many challenges ahead, communication will be vital and we hope we can take them on together for the benefit of the Trust patients.
