Gavin received a kidney from Darren, his brother-in-law, in 2012 and soon after took up cycling. The following year he represented Great Britain in the World Transplant Games and achieved great success.

This summer he has completed the Coast to Coast cycle ride, 150 miles from Seascale on the West Coast to Whitby on the East Coast, going through the Lake District, Yorkshire Dales, Vale of York and the North Yorkshire Moors. It took 11 hours of cycling and was stunning, although there were lots of hills!

To outdo the rest of the team Darren and 3 of his mates cycled Coast to Coast and back again - 300 miles in 24 hours!

Gavin also cycled in the British Transplant Games in August and achieved a Gold Medal in the Cycling Time Trials.

This shows what a difference it makes to have a Kidney Transplant and also that the Donor is still able to live life to the full after donation.

Well done to both of you, I'm sure this will give encouragement to others who may thinking about donation.

Gavin is a supporter of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Kidney Patients' Association and organises the magazines that the K.P.A. provides on the wards for patients to read.

Controlling Phosphate

I am sure you have all heard about the importance of controlling phosphate in your diet. This can often be raised in kidney patients. Unfortunately phosphate is mainly found in protein foods which are a very important part of your diet for staying well nourished.

There are a number of ways that by changing the types of protein you eat, you can reduce your phosphate levels within a few days. On our website there is a list of food options to help with this.

Another important issue is taking your phosphate binders correctly. This will also help to keep your phosphate levels under control. There are many different phosphate binders available giving patients more choice of how they prefer to take them – powder, tablets that have to be chewed and tablets that have to be swallowed. The choice of phosphate binder will also depend on other factors such as your calcium level which your doctor and dietitian advise you on.

There are more details on this subject on our website to help you to keep healthy. All this information is provided by the Renal Dietitians at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

ONLY time we ask all Renal Patients for their support.

Improvements in care for HD patients at Q.E.

Over a year ago, following an increase in infection in haemodialysis patients associated with having dialysis catheters fitted, we chose to assess a number of new dressings. As a result of these trials, Q.E.H.B. decided to use Tegaderm Advanced Dressings for all patients. These have given a number of benefits. The dressings remain in place for the full seven days. They protect the patient by lowering the risk of contamination and infection. They also reduced episodes of skin irritation due to reducing the number of dressings used when compared with the previous items.

All Patients with a new dialysis catheter will continue to have the patch applied for the first few weeks until their exit site is healed.

Although we can claim the change has been very successful, we will continue to look for further improvements.

Thank you to all our patients for their support with these changes.

Message from the K.P.A. Chairman, Nick Flint

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you who have supported the K.P.A. this year and over previous years.

I have had the privilege of being Chairman for many years and am always pleased to hear how highly regarded our K.P.A. is with patients. I know how difficult it can be being a renal patient. I spent several years on dialysis and was very fortunate to receive a transplant.

The K.P.A. has very hard working committee members who put a lot of time and effort into running this charity. Without them, it would not be possible to give support to patients and the Hospital.

This year we have been very well supported. The Christmas raffle 2014/15 was very successful and we have had many donations from patients for which we are very grateful. This has also enabled us to continue to support research projects at the Hospital and we have several projects that are being planned.

Last year I spent time working with N.I.C.E.. They were putting together standards for renal treatments, one of which was to improve times for patient transport. This was accepted as a new National Standard last November. This year I have been involved as a patient representative with Birmingham City Commissioners who are developing a new patient transport contract, so I am lobbying for Renal Patients to get a better deal. Renal patients who need transport 6 times per week should have a better service than they receive currently.

Our website gets about 2300 hits a month. If you have not yet had a look, it contains information about treatments and ideas for cooking and eating well on renal diets.

Research Update:-Vascular Access Project K.P.A. funded last year £23000

Good Vascular Access (VA) is a critical for patients on haemodialysis (HD) but commonly is a source of problems. One problem area is when newly formed fistulas don't mature to a point where they can be used for dialysis. Although it appears from the studies that the results in the UK (and particularly at the QE) are much better than the United States, we still see up to a third of the fistulas we create having problems. We are very keen to try to improve this for patients and have many studies under way at the QE to address some of the problems.

With the support of K.P.A funding we have just completed one of the largest studies ever done in fistula surgery with 200 patients from the QE participating. This study uses a small skin patch which releases a chemical (GTN) through the skin. This has potential to improve the blood flow through the newly formed fistula and may assist in improving outcomes. Results from follow up are still coming through and the effects require analysis. As with all

research studies the strict approach to comparing a treatment with a control, or placebo is necessary to be able to accurately assess a treatment. This allows the benefits of a treatment if they are present to be defined, and also the side effects and disadvantages to be clearly studied. We are grateful to the patients who agreed to take part in the study.

The ability to perform quality research places the QE at the forefront of vascular access provision and new technologies to be made available to patients at an early stage. This study has led to a number of other studies in vascular access which will open opportunities and improve care for patients requiring VA for HD.

The support of the K.P.A is essential to facilitate this research into common problems that affect the majority of dialysis patients at some stage. It is through this research we aim to improve the success of vascular access and improve the patient experience.
